The Summit for Sustainable Travel in the Hawaiian Islands, which was part of the UH Mānoa Fund Grant in which **Dr. Harold Richins** of the TIM School and Dr. John Cusick of the UH Environmental Center received in 2008, took place on April 21

at the East West Center Imin Conference Center in Honolulu and April 24 at Maui Community College. The event was the first of a series of workshops hosted by UH that would connect key stakeholders to collaborate on opportunities and gener-

It seemed to be an excellent time to be there since the Spanish government announce 1.9 bn euros to develop sustainable tourism inland away from the coasts where most development has been until now. They are looking at alternative tourism—agri-tourism, wellness tourism, adventure and rural tourism and more. The

Andalucian government also released a Sustainable Tourism plan for the next five years and they were busy studying these and looking at the repercussions for Sevilla.

Internationalizing the curriculum and encouraging overseas academic experiences are fundamental objectives of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa and the **UH Study Abroad Center** makes it possible for students to experience, learn and recognize other cultures and their environments.

TIM School Receives Grant on Hawai'i Tourism Workforce Development

To further the development of a qualified tourism workforce, the HTA and the Department of Labor and Industrial Relations (DLIR) have established the Tourism Workforce Coordination project in 2009 and the TIM School has been selected to assist in monitoring progress made on the Tourism Workforce Development Strategic Plan 2007-2015, identifying additional funding sources for tourism workforce training initiatives and developing a website. The \$85,000 project is directed by Dr. Russell Uyeno and the project coordinator is Lance Kimura (MS '07). Dr. George

Ikeda is also assisting the project.

The Tourism Workforce Advisory Council is in the process of being assembled. Participating advisory council members will include a variety of stakeholders from the various sectors of the tourism industry. Once assembled, the advisory council will meet on a quarterly basis to address key workforce training needs and recommend program strategies to HTA and DLIR.

Another important part of the project will be the development of a website that is devoted to workforce training for the tourism industry. In addition to being a convenient site to learn about new education and training needs, the website http:// www.hitourismcareers.org> will include sections devoted to job seekers, employers, and education and training providers. Other features will include; a job search page to assist in finding information on careers in the tourism industry, videos about individuals in the industry who have used additional training to enhance their careers, and comprehensive listing of tourismrelated career data.

In 2007, the TIM School completed a study for the Hawaii Tourism Authority (HTA) to determine the industry's workforce training needs. The Vision 2015, Tourism Workforce Development Strategic Plan identified the key needs for workforce preparation issues for Hawaii's tourism industry. In addition to identifying key training needs, the plan recommended the development of an ongoing Tourism Workforce Council to monitor, coordinate, and implement employment and workforce development services for the tourism industry.
